These Yizkor books, originally written in Yiddish and Hebrew by former residents as a memorial to their beloved towns and the people who once lived there, have been beautifully translated and edited by our volunteers under the superb supervision of Joel Alpert, Coordinator of the Yizkor books in print. We are very grateful to all of them for their dedication. Original photographs and illustrations are reproduced in these editions.

Our latest available titles:

YAMPOL, UKRAINE - The town is also known as: Yampol [Russian], Yampil [Ukrainian], Yampola [Yiddish], Jampol [Polish], Yambol, Yampol (Wolyn), Iampol, Jampil. Yampol, Ukraine, is in the District of Volhyn. 49°58' N 26°15' E, 191 mi West of Kyyiv. (Not to be confused with a larger Yampol, in Podolia, at 48°15' 28°17'.)

This book is the translation of the Yizkor (Memorial) Book (in Hebrew: Ayara be-lehavot; Pinkas Yampola, Pelekh Volyn-A City in Flames) of the destroyed Jewish Community of Yampol, Ukraine, written by former residents who survived the Holocaust or emigrated before the war. Includes the history of the community, descriptions of the institutions (synagogues, prayer houses), cultural activities, personalities (Rabbis, leaders, prominent people, characters) and other aspects of the town. It also describes the events of the Shoah in the town and lists the victims. All information is either first-hand accounts or based upon first-hand accounts and therefore serves as a primary resource. The book was originally written in Hebrew and Yiddish in 1963, translated into English by volunteers in the Yizkor Book Project of JewishGen, Inc. and then published by the Yizkor-Books-In-Print Project.

PODHAJCE, UKRAINE (Pidhaytsi, Ukraine) - Alternate names: Pidhaytsi [Ukrainian], Podhajce [Polish], Podhaitza [Yiddish], Podgaytsy [Russian], Podhaits, Pidayets, Pidhayets, Pidhajci, Podgaitsy, Podgajcy, Podgaytse, Podhaytse, Pidhajzi. Region of Tarnopol Podhajce is located 28 miles SW of Tarnopil and 30 miles NE of Ivano-Frankivsk (Stanislawów). The book also includes information about these nearby towns: Zlotniki (or Zlotnik), Zloniki, Wioeniowczyk and Zawalow. Originally written in Yiddish, edited by Me'ir Shimon Geshouri and translated into English by Jerrold Landau.

NOVOGRUDOK, UKRAINE (Navahrudak, Belarus) - Have you seen the movie "Defiance" about the Bielski brothers and their group of Jewish partisans? Are your ancestors from Novogrudok? Don't miss this book. All information is either first-hand accounts or based upon first-hand accounts and therefore serves as a primary resource for either researchers or

to individuals seeking information about the town. It is a must for people searching for the history of their ancestors and for researchers looking for primary source material.

We are especially indebted to Oskar Delatycki z"l who coordinated and translated the book together with Aviva Kamil. Without their dedication, this book would not have seen the light of day.

OSTROW MAZOWIECKA: This book is the translation of the Memorial (Yizkor) Book of the destroyed Jewish Community of Ostrow Mazowiecka, Poland, (in Hebrew: Sefer ha-zikaron le-kehilat Ostrov-Mazovyetsk). It contains the history of the community in addition to descriptions of the institutions (synagogues, prayer houses), cultural activities, personalities (Rabbis, leaders, prominent people, characters) and other aspects of the town. It also describes the events of the Shoah in the town and lists the victims. All information is either first-hand accounts or based upon first-hand accounts and therefore serves as a primary resource for either research or to individuals seeking information about the town. The book was originally written in Hebrew and Yiddish in 1960.

My Dad, Alexander Cecil Morris, was truly an orphanmade-good. Born in 1889 in Manhattan, he and three older siblings were orphaned when their parents died of consumption, tuberculosis, and put in an orphanage to keep them together. St. Vincent's School for Boys had a band and taught him to play the harmonica, clarinet and violin. The band occasionally accompanied Theodore Roosevelt and marched in his 1905 Presidential Inauguration Parade.

Morris enlisted in the Navy in 1907 to become a musician, became leader of the Brooklyn Naval Shipyard Band, and made his first radio broadcast from the Edison laboratory in 1920. In 1925, he helped form the US Navy Band in Washington and also became bandleader on the Presidential Yacht "MAYFLOWER," serving Presidents Harding, Coolidge, Hoover, and Roosevelt. Eventually, Morris became leader of the Naval Academy's Band. Lieutenant Commander Morris retired, greatly honored as an exemplary officer, in 1955 with over 47 years' service.

The dish shown, along with a demitasse, Morris swiped from the yacht Mayflower after Franklin Roosevelt, whom he admired, used them. Unfortunately, we boys had no grasp of their value to our parents and smashed the demitasse to bits fooling around. We now know better. If only....
