She recently moved much closer to where I am -- but we still lit together over the phone. It's a small thing but it makes us both very happy."

## **Preserving Your Genealogical Data**

As recently reported by LinkedIn News:

Struggling genetics company 23andMe has announced another round of bad news, revealing plans to lay off more than 200 employees, or roughly 40% of its workforce. 23andMe also reported continuing revenue declines in its quarterly earnings report on Tuesday, saying: "There is substantial doubt about the company's ability to continue as a going concern."

While that situation currently only affects 23andMe, it could just as easily similarly affect another provider at some point. The possibility of any genealogy site discontinuing operations should concern every site's members. In the worst case it could result in the loss of the member's family tree data and DNA data stored solely on the provider's server.

To mitigate the risk of such a situation in the case of family tree data, it's advisable to maintain the primary version of this data in an app on your computer. This assumes that the data in the form of a GEDCOM file (a universal file format recognized by virtually every genealogy app and on-line service) is regularly backed up, preferably to a cloud backup service such as Carbonite. Backing up only to a CD or portable hard drive stored in your home will do you no good if (G-d forbid) your house happens to burn down just as your service provider goes out of business. Having said that, supplementing your cloud backup with an additional backup to portable media stored in your home offers even more protection. You can then update the family tree in your account on a given genealogy site by periodically exporting a GEDCOM file from your local app and uploading it to the site.

Regarding your DNA data stored on a genealogy website, it can be preserved by downloading the data from the site to your computer and, again, ensuring that it's backed up. Here's how:

Genealogy sites which offer DNA processing typically enable members to download their DNA data in the form of a raw text (.txt) file, with the text arranged in a universal format. I had my DNA processed a number of years ago by two providers. My downloaded 23andMe DNA data file is 14.7 MB in size, and my Ancestry data file is 17.1 MB. Those may not seem like large files, but keep in mind that each megabyte of raw text contains 1 million alphanumeric characters, as opposed to, say, a Word or Excel file, in which most of the data consists of the document's formatting.

Although a comprehensive list of genealogy sites which support downloading one's DNA data is beyond the scope of this article, the following three popular sites enable it as follows:

1.) On the MyHeritage home page hover over the DNA tab and click on 'Manage DNA kits'; 2.) On the righthand side of the MyHeritage kit, click on the three dots and choose 'Download'; 3.) Follow the subsequent instructions.

Some (most?) genealogy websites also permit uploading one's DNA data text file. Doing so facilitates identifying your DNA matches on the site, even if you had your DNA processed elsewhere.

Currently, 23andMe (and perhaps others) doesn't support uploading DNA data files obtained from other services. Others allow uploading of DNA data, but only if sourced from a few specified services. Still others may allow it with no restrictions. The main concern of those with restrictions is privacy security in particular, preventing scofflaws from obtaining your DNA data file and uploading it to the genealogy sites' servers for nefarious purposes. Educate yourself on the risks associated with downloading, uploading, and storing your DNA data file prior to taking any such

## Hurricanes and Genealogy by Kim Sheintal

Milton landed in Sarasota as a category 3 hurricane at 8:30 p.m. on October 9, 2024. This storm pushed water inland and had sustained winds of 120 mph. By October 10. I received several emails from my distant cousins from England, Israel, and around the United States to see if I was okay. I received a phone call from Helen to check up on me. Helen is a DNA match of mine in Oklahoma. Helen and I still have no idea how we are related but she calls me on a regular basis! This hurricane made me realize how much family, whether distant or close, looks out for one another. Shortly before I evacuated Sarasota, I put my genealogy papers in the safest place in my house to be protected from flooding and wind damage. I emailed my important genealogy documents to several relatives. No one likes a hurricane, but it took a hurricane to remind me how important family is and how much I want to keep my genealogy records safe.
