CITY DIRECTORIES

City Directories, arguably one of the most over-looked resources by genealogists, have been around since the 1700s. City directories are very useful tools when searching for records of your family. City directory listings include the head of each household with the spouse's name, the person's address, their place of employment (if any), possibly names of relatives living nearby and often some mention of whether the person owns, boards, or rents at that address.

You know you're Jewish if:

You never knew anyone whose last name didn't end in one of five standard suffixes (berg, baum, man, stein and witz.)

You have at least one ancestor who is somehow related to your spouse's ancestor.

Your mother took personal pride when a Jew was noted for some accomplishment (showbiz, medicine, politics, etc.) and was ashamed and embarrassed when a Jew was accused of a crime .. as if they were relatives.

I asked the chatters this evening to write a few words about the AOL Jewish Genealogy Chat Room.

Milt said, "I usually pick up a new or forgotten tidbit every week."

Judi said, "And I met Gay Lynne through the Jewish Genealogy chat room, and then we got to meet in person just a few months later at the Jewish Genealogy Summer Seminar in Boston that year. It seems like whenever I am at a Jewish Genealogy Conference, I am always happily running into Gay Lynne. Twice she has introduced my talk on tombstones at Jewish Genealogy conferences, and one summer, in Toronto, we roomed together at the conference."

Eli said, "This chat is a genealogical playroom where we all share our new discoveries and entertain one another."
