The International Jewish Graveyard Rabbit was created by Schelly Talalay Dardashti, author of Tracing the Tribe - The Jewish Genealogy Blog http://tracingthetribe.blogspot.com. The Jewish Graveyard blog is a new blog focusing on Jewish cemeteries around the world and relevant topics and issues.

This was in response to a call from a major genblogger for locality-specific Graveyard Rabbits (many genbloggers have already responded). Schelly believed that since Jewish cemeteries, no matter the location, share the same language, traditions, customs, an international Jewish Graveyard Rabbit was preferable, and that a team of international writers should contribute with their expertise.

It will cover Jewish cemeteries around the world, preservation and restoration projects; Jewish traditions (death, burial and mourning), Jewish tombstone symbols, how to read a Hebrew tombstone and discover genealogical information, cemetery news and other relevant topics.

Where differences exist, the blog will address Ashkenazi, Sephardi and Mizrahi customs and issues. Photographs will be included, as well as extensive links to sites providing relevant information. Researchers who have visited an ancestral cemetery are invited to participate with their personal experiences and photographs.

In addition to Schelly, the team currently includes Daniel Horowitz-Israel, Celia Male-UK, Gaby Laws-UK, Samuel Gruber-US and David Stoleru-Spain.

Genealogy Tips

The Ancestry Weekly Journal, a free service of Ancestry.com, offered the following tips in their January 12, 2009 journal.

Often the focus on our direct ancestor and siblings causes us to overlook that spinster aunt or bachelor uncle. The fact is, we should be researching every sibling thoroughly because while the records of one child may not include the information you need, and those of a sibling may include the information you need.

There may be siblings that you don't even know about. Many years ago, high child mortality rates were a fact of life. You might discover these children in family cemetery plots and in vital records indexes. For mothers who were alive in 1900 and 1910, the U.S. federal census asked for the number of children born, and the 1910 census also asks how many were still alive that year. Mortality schedules will also list the children who died within a census year. Once you identify a child who died young, look for their birth and death records.

Half siblings on your tree share one parent with your ancestors and their records could contain valuable information.

"Who Do You Think You Are?" New Realty TV Show Coming on NBC in April

Dick Eastman has written many times about "Who Do You Think You Are," a very popular British television that has since been exported to other countries. Each country produces their own shows, featuring local television personalities and stories. Now NBC will bring the television program to American viewers, starting April 20. The program will air on Mondays at 8 PM.

"Who Do You Think You Are?" will feature American celebrities, including Lisa Kudrow, Sarah Jessica Parker and Susan Sarandon, as they unearth their family trees. Kudrow's company, Is or Isn't Entertainment, will produce the programs, along with the U.K.'s Wall to Wall Productions.

The series will examine a star's family tree and uncover stories about love, secrets and triumphs in his or her family's past, while also weaving the family story into the larger narrative of American history.

"This show personalizes history and turns it into a gripping narrative," Kudrow says. "The most striking thing about the show is the realization of how connected we all are."

The first of six episodes of "Who Do You Think You Are?" is set to premiere on April 20, 2009 at 8:00 PM. Lisa Kudrow, Sarah Jessica Parker and Susan Sarandon will explore their family histories in what NBC is calling a new "U.S. reality series." The former "Friends" star, Lisa Kudrow, is also the executive producer.

According to Curt B. Witcher, president of the National Genealogical Society and head of the genealogy department of the Allen County Public, "It is a very significant event for genealogy-based programming to make it onto mainstream, American network television.....There are so many lessons that can be taught and learned through exploring genealogy."

JGS of Long Island Yearbook Project

Nolan Altman – Project Coordinator (Yearbooks are a Source of Genealogical Information)

What picture comes to mind when you think about your grandparents? Your parents? For your entire life, you've known them as adults, doing adult things. But we forget that they were and teens and young adults too! Finding a picture and / or information about your grandparents or parents from their formative years can be a very rewarding addition to anyone's family history research.

High school, college and other miscellaneous school yearbooks or class lists can be an interesting source of genealogical information and photographs. You might find out that your relative participated in sports, scholastic teams, won academic awards, was a class officer, etc. Maybe your relative's subsequent vocation or avocation goes back to when they were a member of the Biology Club, Drama Club, or school orchestra? Wouldn't it be fun to be able to add a picture of Grandma Ruth when she was a member of her school chorus?

The JGSLI Board decided that it would be a valuable service to its members if we could inventory yearbooks in our members' personal libraries and make that information available for genealogical look-ups. JGSLI commenced its Yearbook Project in June of 2006 with the goal of acting as an intermediary to match researchers with yearbook owners.

During the last year, we have been able to match up dozens of researchers with yearbook owners. Since our list of yearbooks is made public on our website (http://www.jgsli.org/yearbook_project.htm), we have received inquiries from not only our members, but non-members as well. We realize that since our membership's yearbooks are from the New York City / Long Island area, the information in those books could be of interest to researchers from around the country.

The interest from non-members outside of the NYC / LI area gave us the idea of expanding our project to inventory yearbooks from other local JGSs, other genealogical groups and other interested individuals. A number of non-member researchers have inquired if they could list their books on our site as well.

JGSLI's Role: JGSLI does not own, nor do we physically have custody of the yearbooks listed on our site. The books are in the personal libraries of those that are making them available for genealogical look-ups. JGSLI will act as the "matchmaker" between the owner of the information and the researcher. When a request comes to us, using the e-mail address on our site (http://www.yearbook_project@jgsli.org/), we will reply to the researcher and forward the request to the owner of the book by using a blind cc. It is up to the owner of the material to comply with the request. (People signing up for the program do so with the understanding that there will be requests.)

Owner's Role: The owner of the material submits a signed JGSLI Yearbook Project Form which they can download from our website (http://www.jgsli.org/Yearbook_Form.pdf). The agreement states in part, "Submitting a listing means that you have volunteered to be contacted by e-mail and are willing to provide information, a photocopy, or scan for the researcher. JGSLI is only making the information available to researchers. Owners of the books are responsible for following up with the request."

Researcher's Role: Researchers can contact us through the e-mail address listed at http://www.yearbook_project@jgsli.org/. We would appreciate if requesters of information also become providers of information to help fellow researchers.

How You Can Help

We know that the members of other social groups, their families and friends can be an important source of yearbooks and we would be very grateful for your help to grow our database. Due to the success and smooth operation of the project as it currently exists, and since we have been receiving requests from non-members for information as well as interest on how to list their own yearbooks on our site, the JGSLI Board has decided to reach out to other potential sources. Our long term goal is to expand the inventory of yearbooks available and to facilitate matches to researchers and family members.

We would appreciate if you would consider helping us by allowing us to include your yearbooks in our listing so our database will be more valuable to researchers. Calendar Trivia

(from Nu? What's Nu? - Volume 10, Number 1 | Jan. 14, 2009)

Here are some of the fascinating discoveries uncovered when using Stephen P. Morse's latest contribution called "When did..." It allows comparisons between dates of the secular and Hebrew calendar. A more practical use is to determine yahrzeit (anniversary of death) dates for any year.

Is it possible for Chanukah to occur before Thanksgiving? No, but they do occur on the same day about once every hundred years. The next time it will happen is in 2013.

Can Purim coincide with Valentine's Day? Yes. It last occurred in 1995 and will take place again in 2014.

The last time the first day of Passover and Easter Sunday coincided was in 1983, and it will not occur again until 2123.

The earliest Rosh Hashanah can happen on the secular calendar is September 5, but it is rare. It will occur in 2013, but will not take place again until 2089.

Stephen Morse Lecture for

Four JGS of SW FL members went to the Charlotte County Genealogical Society Workshop on February 14 to hear renowned genealogist/computer scientist Stephen Morse discuss and explain his One-Step site for family research. His site includes more than 100 Web-based tools for tasks ranging from genealogical searches to last-minute bidding on eBay. Morse, member of the San Francisco JGS, has received the Outstanding Contribution and Lifetime Achievement awards from IAJGS and is the creator of http://www.stevemorse.org/ and designed the Intel 8086, ancestor of today's Pentium processors.
