One week prior to my Jewish Genealogy presentation for the Temple Emanu-El Brotherhood in March, I prepared a list of recommended genealogy websites. As I reviewed my list, I tested each website. I tested the JewishGen Family Finder link on the JewishGen website and looked for people tracing one specific surname. I spotted a listing by Eli and sent him an email. Eli suggested that I contact Debbi. Debbi gave me some leads. Because of this one initial contact, I now have a list of potential cousins. Since then, I have made cold calls to people in Canada, New York, Maryland, and California with the same surname that I am tracing. I must sound convincing because all these people have been receptive and interested in learning if there is a family connection. But, I am not the only person who benefited from my talk. This week, I received an e-mail from someone who heard my presentation at the Brotherhood to let me know that she tried JewishGen Family Finder after my talk and found a cousin.

This month, I learned about a new feature on the JewishGen website <http://www.jewishgen.org>. Click "JewishGen" on the menu bar at the top of the JewishGen home page and select from the pull-down menu "Search this website." A search form will appear. This form allows you to search all of the text on JewishGen's web pages. Note that this search does **not** include JewishGen's databases (such as the JewishGen Family Finder), which must be searched separately. Warren Blatt, JewishGen Managing Director, states that there are 43,000 static web pages at the JewishGen website.

Periodically check genealogy websites and other genealogy sources such as the genealogical collections at libraries. Come to the May 17 JGS of SW FL meeting to learn about the genealogy department at Selby Library and get a guided tour.

Program Announced for the 29th IAJGS International Conference on Jewish Genealogy by Schelly Talalay Dardashti

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Jewish Genealogy's yearly highlight, the 29th International Conference on Jewish Genealogy will take place Sunday, August 2 to Friday, August 7, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, cosponsored by the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Philadelphia (JGSGP) and the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies (IAJGS). Program co-chair, Mark Halpern, recently discussed program and speaker plans for this year's event.

Keynote Speaker

Father Patrick Desbois, author of Holocaust by Bullets: A Priest's Journey to Uncover the Truth behind the Murder of 1.5 Million Jews, will keynote Sunday evening's opening session. Father Desbois has spoken at the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC, and many other venues about his investigative work. In the planning are a question and answer session, a book sale, and an author signing.

Several workshops will kick off the annual event earlier on Sunday: a three-hour Beginning Jewish Genealogy workshop, a two-hour Jumpstarting Philadelphia Research with specifically Jewish resources, and a three-hour Repository Fair for local archives, libraries, and other institutions to showcase holdings and answer questions, as well as other programs and workshops. Tracks and Programs

Halpern notes, "We are very pleased at the response to our Call for Papers. More than 150 speakers submitted more than 280 programs for consideration by the program committee. The number and diversity of the offerings will guarantee an exciting, interesting, and diverse program." A sampling of events includes the following:

- A program on the archives of the Joint Distribution Committee will offer information about this valuable resource.
- Ukraine is in the spotlight at this year's event, with a photo exhibit of contemporary Ukrainian Jewish life being planned. Lectures will include Valery Bazarov speaking on Jewish tradition and life in Odessa, Ukrainian Jewish research by deputy director Olga Muzychuk of the Ukraine Archives system, two talks by Dr. Zvi Gitelman of Michigan on Jewish emigration from Ukraine and roles played by Ukrainians in the Holocaust, and new archival projects in Ukraine with Miriam Weiner. Muzychuk and Weiner will also lead a Ukraine Breakfast with the Experts.
- First-time tracks include Jews and Food (programs include the impact of Jewish traders and merchants, and Turkish cooking) and Jews in Sports.
- DNA and Genealogy programs include talks on Jewish genetic diseases and genealogy in conjunction with the Victor Center for Jewish Genetic Diseases at the city's Albert Einstein Medical Center and Genzyme Corporation.

- The Cemetery Research, Preservation, and Restoration track features the CEO of the Foundation for Preservation of Jewish Heritage in Poland.
- Holocaust Research will include the Role of Women in the Resistance, plus new resources from France, Israel, and Germany (from the International Tracing Service and the U.S. Holocaust Memorial Museum).
- Migration and Immigration will offer programs on the U.S. South and New Jersey's Jewish agricultural colonies.
- Languages sessions will focus on learning the Cyrillic alphabet and reading Polish language records.

Evening Programs

Evening programs include:

- Dr. Jonathan Sarna is Brandeis University Professor of American Jewish History and Chief Historian for the 350th commemoration of the American Jewish community. Sarna is recognized as the leading commentator on American Jewish history, religion, and life. This event is co-sponsored by the National American Museum of Jewish History <www.NMAJH.org>.
- "Yiddish in Story, Poem and Song" is being planned and combines a lecture, recordings, and live performance, as a performer and cultural historian collaborate on a personal guided tour through centuries of Yiddish cultural creation.
- JewishGen's annual program spotlights new features along with previews of future developments and projects.
- "Jewish Genealogy Game Show Night," produced by Ron Arons and Pamela Weisberger, will permit conference attendees to demonstrate their genealogical knowledge, historical acumen, and research skills as they participate in a variety of game show formats adapted to the world of Jewish genealogy. Possibilities include Genealogical Jeopardy, SIG Family Feud and Name That Jewish Tune. Prizes and surprises are guaranteed.

Immigrant Bank Records

Genealogists searching Philadelphia Jewish roots have a unique and valuable resource in immigrant bank records. These commercial enterprises allowed recent immigrants to save money and to arrange the purchase of steamship tickets to bring family members to the United States. These records, known as Passage Order Books, are preserved at the Philadelphia Jewish Archive Center <www. philajewisharchives.org>. JGSGP volunteers have indexed records for the Blitzstein Bank (1888-1930), Lipschutz Bank (1906-1948) and Rosenbaum Bank (1894-1927); the indexes are included in the JewishGen All USA Database.

Founded as an immigrant bank, Rosenbluth Travel is one of the largest, most successful travel agencies in the U.S. The Rosenbluth family retains possession of its historic Passage Order Book from the immigrant years and has funded the book's digitization which will be indexed by JGSGP volunteers. The images and indexes will be available to conference attendees. "We are happy to make public more than 600 pages of entries from a Rosenbluth Bank book previously unavailable," said conference co-chair David Mink. "We are in the process of indexing the data." In conjunction with this important resource, Dr. Rebecca Kobrin, Assistant Professor of American Jewish

History at Columbia University, will speak about her research into Jewish immigrant banks.

Philadelphia-area Resource Directory

The JGSGP also has prepared a detailed Philadelphia- Area Jewish Genealogical Resources Directory offering detailed information on general genealogical resources, on synagogues (including rabbi lists, founders, and more), Jewish institutions, cemeteries, libraries, and archives. The Directory will have a direct link to the conference website and also may be found at the JGSGP homepage, <<u>http://jewishgen.org/jgsp></u>. In addition, Monday programming will feature Philadelphia research so that attendees with roots in the area may plan how to use these resources to their best advantage.

Technology and Workshops

Mindful of the interrelationship between genealogy and technology, sessions will focus on the use of Google and other powerful Internet resources, face recognition technology, and the phenomena of Internet social media and genealogical applications.

Two-hour hands-on workshops for Friday morning will include photo identification, document and photo preservation, and Jewish cooking.

Tours

Numerous sites illustrate the Philadelphia area's Jewish history. Conference planners have arranged visits to cemeteries in northeast Philadelphia and in Delaware County, tours to southern New Jersey agricultural colonies (Alliance and Woodbine), a bus tour, and a walking tour of once largely Jewish South Philadelphia, the historic Colonial-era Congregation Mikveh Israel, and other visits to important congregations (Adath Jeshurun, Reform Congregation Keneseth Israel, Congregation Beth Shalom, and Rodeph Shalom). A trip will be offered to the Eastern State Penitentiary's Jewish chapel. More Details

Member's Amazing Discovery

For a lark in February, I searched JewishGen's "Family Tree of the Jewish People," not expecting to find anything that I had not previously found. BUT, I found my great great grandfather and his wife with a child different from my great grandfather. When I contacted the person who had posted the tree, I quickly found that she had a handwritten family tree with lots of names previously unknown to me. We began an exchange, as some of her data did not jibe with mine. The person who had posted the tree lives in Israel, as do my step-family, and he translated from German an 1838 marriage registration that cleared up some of the confusion and corrected the data. He also was able to trace my family back to an earlier generation from a different German town that I had never heard of. I then went to the LDS Family History Center and from its microfilms and the tree data, I was able to connect my family to that of another Israeli, who I met in 2004. Our previous efforts to tie our lines together had failed. The Family Tree site is not only searchable by name, but also by town or country. Another genealogist suggested a different translation technique: "Viewmate" on JewishGen. Our JewishGen SIG also allows postings of docs that need translation. To me, this is a WOW.

According to Warren Blatt (JewishGen Managing Director), JewishGen's ViewMate program, which has been down for several months for the correction of technical problems, is once again up and running. ViewMate can be accessed via the JewishGen home page under "Projects", or directly at <http://www.jewishgen.org/ViewMate>. ViewMate is the most convenient way to post images which you would like to identify, translate, ask questions about, etc.

A first name is also known as a forename or a given name.

According to http://www.genealogy.com/35_donna.htmlon: "In genealogy we usually concentrate on surnames since they are the most important way of identifying people who are related. A surname is usually inherited and, while it may be changed, some form of it is usually retained. Given names are more important in a way because they represent a voluntary choice by the parents or, sometimes, by an individual. A name is usually not given lightly. It represents thought and feelings and can be significant to the researcher."

JewishGen Family Finder

JewishGen Family Finder http://www.jewishgen.org/jgff is a compilation of surnames and towns currently being researched by over 80,000 Jewish genealogists worldwide. The JGFF was created in 1982 by Gary Mokotoff, and is now maintained by JewishGen, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation.

1982: The New York-based Jewish Genealogical Society published a 37-page typewritten roster of ancestral towns and surnames being researched by 83 members of the society. This was the start of what became the "Jewish Genealogical Family Finder".

1994: The JGFF was made available on the Internet, via a World Wide Web and e-mail retrieval system developed by Warren Blatt for JewishGen.

1996: A new online system was developed for JewishGen by Michael Tobias, which included the ability to enter and modify entries online. Ownership of the JGFF was transferred from the Jewish Genealogical Society (New York), to JewishGen, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation, in order to make the data more widely available. It was renamed *JewishGen Family Finder*. **2009 Statistics:**

- An average of 10 new users and 100 new surname/town entries are added every day.
- JGFF contains over 400,000 entries (100,000 ancestral surnames and 18,000 town names).
- JewishGen is completely free of cost to users, there are costs to administer and maintain the database. It is suggested that those who are benefiting and using the JGFF for their research to send a voluntary \$25 annual donation.
