Jewish Genealogy Month

The International Jewish Genealogy Month is celebrated during Cheshvan, corresponding in 2012 to October 17 through November 14. Each year, an International Jewish Genealogy Month Poster Contest is coordinated by the International Association of Jewish Genealogical Societies to promote Jewish Genealogy Month. The purpose of International Jewish Genealogy Month is to make people aware of Jewish Genealogy and show that Jewish Genealogical Societies can help them get started on tracing their families. This year, the winning International Jewish Genealogy Month poster was designed by JGS of SW FL members, Lynn Teichman and Tuvia Natkin.

Lynn comes from a background of the arts and education creating logos and graphics for non-profits, teaching as artist-inresidence and volunteering as a mentor in public schools. Tuvia's career in Jewish education includes many years as a writer and translator. His career in music led to journalism and advertising and a move to Israel for further studies. Looking back to his family roots in Russia and finding rabbis and Yiddish novelists sparked his interest in genealogy and a realization that discovering one's past plays a vital role in educating a new generation. The poster's design of a hand with a tree texture on a background of surnames signifies a tree of life reaching for our past. Searching, we grow as a tree. The surnames are from the archives of the JGS of SW FL members.

Lifetime Achievement Award - Dr. Jeffrey S. Malka

This award honors your pioneering work in Sephardic genealogical studies. You have provided focus, resources and leadership to the study of Sephardic genealogy. Your writing, websites and lectures have opened doors for researchers by making both methodology and information accessible to all. You have reminded the entire Jewish genealogy community of our diversity. You have served on many committees of Jewish genealogy organizations at the local and international level. High standards and your generosity in sharing your time and knowledge underscore all of your many accomplishments.

Outstanding Contribution to Jewish Genealogy Via the Internet, Print or Electronic Project - Logan Kleinwaks

Your exceptional creation and management of the Genealogy Indexer is a unique innovation in the field of Jewish Genealogy. This free website makes available searches of original documents, which have not been indexed, from many sources around the world, primarily from central and eastern Europe. Your work has enabled researchers to find family names buried in foreign language documents through the use of optical character recognition and soundex technology. Your website has advanced research opportunities by facilitating access to these valuable documents to anyone with access to the internet.

Outstanding Program or Project Award - The ViewMate Project This award is given in recognition of The ViewMate Project. Conceived and initiated by Bernard Kouchel, this innovative and widely-used tool helps researchers understand genealogyrelated documents, photographs and artifacts. Researchers can share images with peers who volunteer to provide translations and explanations. An integral part of JewishGen, this interactive project connects the international genealogical community allowing those with questions to benefit from the expertise and experience of those who answer them.

Outstanding Publication by an IAJGS Member Association

Shemot, the outstanding journal of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Great Britain is published with a distinct theme three times each year. Each issue attracts contributors with expertise in the theme and provides articles with breadth and depth. The content of this relevant, informative and worthwhile journal reflects the skill set of a strong network of member and nonmember contributors. Although the high-quality and original articles are primarily of interest to individuals researching British roots and those whose families trans-migrated through Great Britain, they are relevant to all researchers.

Stern Grant Awards Shared by Two Projects

A Rabbi Malcolm Stern Grant was awarded to the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee to continue the printing, digitizing and indexing of records in their archives, particularly those focusing on the overseas rescue, relief, and rehabilitation of Jews during the middle of the 20th century. They will then be made available online world-wide. 300,000 digitized documents at http://archives.jdc.org/archives-search/?s=archivestopnav.

A Rabbi Malcolm Stern Grant was awarded to The Israel Genealogy Research Association (IGRA). The Grant is for the completion of a search engine able to handle both English and Hebrew searches, which will enable researchers not familiar with the other language to find the families they are searching. Such a search engine does not presently exist. Materials currently being scanned and indexed are records from the British Mandate period. The IGRA multi-lingual website at http://genealogy.org.il has a world-wide audience.

Yizkor Appeal: Commemorate Names of Shoah Victims

"May the L-rd remember the souls of the holy and pure ones who were killed, murdered, slaughtered, burned, drowned, and strangled for the sanctification of the Name "

The word yizkor (to remember) refers to a special prayer said on behalf of family members who have passed away. Yizkor presents living relatives with an opportunity to spiritually elevate the soul of a departed loved one. The experience of reciting Yizkor can be a powerful moment of reflection and remembrance. Also included in the service are memorial prayers for collectively martyred fellow Jews - those who were murdered simply because they were Jews. During Yizkor, when hearts and minds are filled with memories of generations past it is a most fitting time to be reminded of our moral imperative to memorialize the victims of the Shoah. The Jews are a people of memory. Our history is an integral part of us and we pass it from generation to generation. In reciting Yizkor we remember the collective tragedies of our people as well as our own personal losses. It is incumbent upon us to remember them. If we do not take action, their legacies will be lost to us forever.

Yad Vashem's Shoah Victims' Names Recovery Project aims to fulfill the desires and wishes of the victims themselves that their names be remembered forever and that no Holocaust victim is forgotten.

Please take this opportunity to call on your congregants and community members to make sure that the names of each of their loved ones and acquaintances that were murdered during the Holocaust are registered for generations to come in Yad Vashem, Jerusalem.

This is a race against time. Act now before those who still remember them are gone forever. Search for information or submit names of people you know of who were killed during the Shoah on Yad Vashem's Central Database of Shoah Victims' Names.

HOW CAN YOU HELP? * SHARE *

Share a unique video message from Rabbi Israel Meir Lau, Chairman of the Yad Vashem Council, drawing on biblical sources on the importance of commemorating the Jews who perished during the Shoah. Yizkor-Books-in-Print Project – Project of Jewishgen.org

JewishGen is proud to announce our new Yizkor-Books-in-Print Project. Yizkor books are a great resource to genealogists and the volunteers involved in this project are translating a number of books from Hebrew or Yiddish to English and YBIP (Yizkor Books in Print) is publishing them in hard cover in a similar format.

The books offer information seldom found in genealogical data and may provide clues to families and their lives. Through personal accounts, they detail the history, the rich cultural life, the institutions, personalities, and organizations that existed in before destruction by the Nazis during World War II.

Following are details about several of the books and a list of others now available and those in the process of publication. There are currently nine books in print, six more in production, with many more to come.

The Destruction of Czestochowa (Czestochowa, Poland) was first published in Buenos Aires, Argentina in 1949 in Yiddish by survivors and former residents of the town. For the assistance of researchers, the town has also been known as: Czestochowa [Polish], Chenstochov [Yiddish], Tschenstochau [German], Censtochová [Cz], Chenstokhova [Russian], Chenstokhov, Chestokhova, Tshenstokhov.

A second book in the series is *Brzezin: a Memorial Book* (Poland) first published in 1961 by survivors and former residents, translated from the Yiddish by Renee Miller and coordinated and edited by Fay Vogel Bussgang. The town is also known by these names: Brzeziny [Polish], Bezhezhin [Yiddish], Bzheziny [Russian], Berzin, Brezhin, Breziny, Bzhezini, Bzshezshin, Löwenstadt [German, 1941-45].
