On May 28, 2016, I received my DNA matches from Ancestry.com with almost 3,000 matches. I sent messages to many of my matches with hopes of hearing from several people. One day at 2:38 AM, someone responded to me. I responded back that same day at 6:45 AM. By 3:43 PM that day, we realized our great grandmothers were sisters with proof we found on an 1858 census record. This was my first response from one of my Ancestry DNA matches and many more followed. From this first response, I was able to add all of the descendants of my great grandmother's sister to my family tree. One response can lead to many connections. This was an awesome discovery. Some would say this was luck that I made such a great discovery from the first person who responded. Part of it was luck, but there was an element of work done to make this lucky occurrence happen.

- Did I send brief messages to just a few of my DNA matches or did I send detailed messages to many of my DNA matches? I sent detailed messages to many of my DNA matches.
- Did I mail my DNA sample to one company or did I mail my DNA sample to multiple companies? I sent my DNA sample to two companies and had my mother submit her DNA too.
- Did I trace my surnames back only to my grandparents without researching from which city they came or did I trace back my family many generations with their cities of origin so that I have a huge database of possibilities to connect to my DNA matches? I traced my families back many generations with their cities of origin.

Be prepared for the "Interpreting Your DNA Results" lecture on January 15, 2017 by submitting your DNA sample now. It takes about six weeks to get your results.

https://familysearch.org/wiki/en/Genealogical_Proof_Standard The purpose of the Genealogical Proof Standard is to show what the minimums are that a genealogist must do for his or her work to be credible. Elements to the Genealogical Proof Standard are:

- Reasonably Exhaustive Research
- Complete and Accurate Source Citation
- Analysis and Correlation of the Collected Information
- Resolution of Conflicting Evidence
- Soundly Reasoned, Coherently Written Conclusion
