One aspect of your genealogical research can be writing your family's history via paragraph format, poems, songs, etc. With that in mind, the Jewish Genealogical Society of Southwest Florida presents "Publishing Your Family's History: How I learned to stop waiting until I was finished and started being a messenger for generations to come" by Barry Halpern on December 18 at 1:00 p.m. via Zoom.

I am grateful to my relatives who not only put their family history on paper, but shared with me what they wrote. Some of my relatives sent me their collected stories without me even knowing that they had written anything about our family. In most cases, I knew that my relatives were working on the stories and I anxiously awaited to receive a copy. In one case, I asked a relative if he had written family stories and he said "yes" and then emailed me 137 pages. I am glad that I asked. In some cases, my relatives wrote about several surnames with only a few pages actually pertaining to our shared surnames. I treasure my collections of my family history.

I have a box in my house labeled "Personal Family Histories: books, stories, etc." of family stories written by my relatives. This box contains everything from a seven-page stapled booklet to professionally published books. Some of these contain family trees and photos with the stories. In addition to this box, I have numerous family charts and documents stored in folders.

Some of my relatives put their family stories on handwritten notes or simply typed on single sheets of paper. My maternal grandfather's typed poems on single sheets of paper are one example. I collected hundreds of poems that my grandfather wrote over a span of almost fifty years that focused on family milestones such as graduations, weddings, birthday greetings, and baby announcements. These poems tell my family story.

My biggest challenge was trying to find a book that I heard was written about my family in Hebrew. Eventually, I was able to locate the book. Now I want to get that book translated.

Now that you've spent dozens of hours and sleepless nights, lots of money on website subscriptions, and traveled to various archives in other states and countries, what are you going to do with all the materials you've collected? Are you ready to write a book about your family's genealogy and history? How do you even begin? # How Police Can Use Your DNA to Solve Crimes without Consent

The New York Post has an article on How Police Can Use Your DNA to Solve Crimes without Consent. The genealogical community is not uniform in its belief whether law enforcement should or should not have access to their DNA samples from testing sites. Some states have imposed restrictions on how law enforcement can access genetic genealogy and these laws have been reported in the IAJGS Records Access Alerts.

It covers the waterfront- crimes that were solved using DNA from relatives, GEDMatch, CeCe Moore, one of the most successful genetic genealogists working with law enforcement in the country, and more. CeCe summed it up be saying, "everyone should have the right to decide how they wish their own personal DNA to be used." But, she also believes that using public DNA database helps to "efficiently and quickly eliminate the vast majority of the population from being suspected of a crime. This will lead to less wrongful convictions and much more efficient law enforcement investigations." ## I Am Descended from RASHI

Like most American diaspora Jews, most of my ancestral background is sparse. My father's parents came from Czarist Russia early in the 20<sup>th</sup> century. My mother's Polish ancestors came from Kutno in the 1870s. Her German family came to New York in 1856. However my Dutch ancestors came to Boston in 1852, but their family can find roots back to the 11<sup>th</sup> century. My great great grandmother Hannah Keizer DeGoede's ancestor was the noted Talmudic scholar Rabbi Shlomo Yitzciki known as RASHI. RASHI is an acronym for Rabbi Shlomo ben Yitzhak Tzarfati.

RASHI was born in Troyes, France in 1040. His descendants moved to Prague then Warsaw and eventually Amsterdam in the late 17<sup>th</sup> century. RASHI taught his students in Old French and trained his three daughters who were scholars in their own right and wore tefillin, rare in the 12<sup>th</sup> century. There are lots more stories and legends associated with his life and teachings.

I was able to trace this information through Ancestry. A 14<sup>th</sup> cousin linked to my tree and provided the link to RASHI. To really stretch the story, cousin Gary Katz, thinks there are ways to trace the family back to the first century.
