

Mapping Your Ancestors

As you've often heard, the three most important factors when looking at real estate are location, location, and location. And although location may not be the top factor for genealogy, it does play an important role. Families tend to live together, whether it be in the Shtetls of Eastern Europe or the streets of New York City. And we are awash in location information from birth, marriage, death, census records and other sources. Perhaps you've extracted these addresses into lists for handy access. But a list of addresses doesn't readily show when two families lived around the corner from each other. Or moved together from neighborhood to neighborhood over the decades. Only when this information is transformed into a map can we visualize the hidden relationships.

Fortunately, in the computer age taking lists of addresses and converting them into map format is easy. The time consuming part is extracting all the addresses from your source documents and putting them into a list in spreadsheet format. Once that is done, it only takes a few minutes to import that list into Google Maps and format it appropriately. The addresses from the list show up as individual markers. Each person has their own marker color. Each marker is labeled with the person's name and the year they lived there. Clicking on a marker brings up further information, such as the data source (i.e. marriage certificate) and a link back to the person's entry on Ancestry.com. All of this happens automatically based on the information that was included in the imported spreadsheet.

To make a map with your own addresses, you would need a Google account (they are free) and some basic computer skills. If you've done basic spreadsheet work in the past you should be all set. Instructions for doing so are located here: <u>http://tinyurl.com/8vpmtsnk</u>

Hebrew Versus Gregorian Calendars

Hebrew calendar aka Jewish calendar is lunisolar, based on lunar months of 29 days alternating with 30 days. An extra month is intercalated every three years, based on a cycle of 19 years.

The date of Jewish holidays does not change from year to year. Holidays are celebrated on the same day of the Jewish calendar every year.

Jewish genealogical researchers may find dates in their resources that use the Gregorian calendar and/or the Jewish calendar.

The Gregorian calendar is a solar calendar based on a 365-day common year divided into 12 months of irregular lengths. 11 of the months have either 30 or 31 days, while the second month, February, has only 28 days during the common year. "Nearly" every four years is a leap year, when one day is added on 29 February, making the leap year in the Gregorian calendar 366 days long. To be a leap year, the year number must be divisible by four – except for end-ofcentury years, which must be divisible by 400. This means that the year 2000 was a leap year, although 1900 was not. 2024, 2028, 2032 and 2036 are all leap years.

"The Hebrew calendar is based on both the lunar and the solar cycles (lunisolar calendar). Months are measured by one revolution of the moon around the earth. According to the Talmud, one complete revolution of the moon around the earth takes 29.53059 days (Masechet Rosh Hashana). This value is very close to the average value measured by NASA: 29.530588. Since the average value is about 29.5 days, months alternate between 29 and 30 days in the Hebrew calendar (see Table below). The common year in the Hebrew calendar includes 12 months. But there is a difference of about 11 days between 12 lunar cycles and one solar cycle. One complete rotation of the earth around the sun takes 365.25 days. Within a one-year period, 12 lunar cycles are completed in $12 \times$ 29.53059 = 354.36708 days. Therefore the difference between 12 lunar cycles and one solar cycle is precisely 365.25 - 354.36708 = 10.88292 days. To synchronize the lunar counting of days with the solar cycle, every 19 years a leap year is added wherein the month of Adar is replaced by two months, Adar Alef and Adar Beit (אדר א' ואדר ב'). Thus, a leap year in the Hebrew calendar includes 13 months."
