My Family Tree Journey

Each person has two parents, four grandparents, eight great grandparents, and sixteen great grandparents. I research my birth surname of Klapman. I research my mother's maiden name of Lebovitz. I research my paternal grandmother's maiden name of Matis and my maternal grandmother's maiden name of Contorer. With my four great grandmothers, I add the surnames of Szwarcbort, Lamarz, Kasrilzon, and Jaffe to my research. With my great great grandmothers, I have the potential to add eight more surnames to research. I add three surnames of my great great grandmothers: Zydek, Taub, and Leisman to research. With my great great grandmothers, I add surnames Szrajer, Abraham, Berman, and what I think is a different Taub line than the Taub of my great great grandmother to research. With my great great great great grandmothers, I add the Moyszesz surname to research. With my great great great great grandmothers, I add the Atkats surname to research. Researching these 17 surnames led to my extensive collection of family stories, documents, and photos, while adding many new people to my family tree.

The surnames to research on one's direct line are: you (one surname at birth)

2 parents (potential to add one surname)

4 grandparents (potential to add 2 surnames)

8 great grandparents (potential to add 4 surnames)

16 gg grandparent (potential to add 8 surnames)

32 ggg grandparents (potential to add 16 surnames)

64 gggg grandparents (potential to add 32 surnames)

128 gggg grandparents (potential to add 64 surnames)

There will always be pedigree collapse at some point. Pedigree collapse describes how reproduction between two individuals who knowingly or unknowingly share an ancestor causes the family tree of their offspring to be smaller than it would otherwise be. In my family pedigree collapse occurred and thus two of my ggg grandparents are also my gggg grandparents.

I have discovered many cousins around the world (and even some living just a few minutes from my house). Some cousins found me; others I found. In addition, I have reconnected with cousins I had not seen in over 50 years. Several of my cousins are actively tracing their families. One cousin is a professional genealogist who lectures on reclaiming records and DNA. Another cousin is a Russian history professor who wrote a book about our Russian roots. Many of my cousins are active genealogy volunteers raising money for shtetl research, serving on genealogical society boards, and maintaining family trees with thousands of names.

Hundreds of my relatives have enlightened my genealogy experience via phone, in person, on Zoom, and written communications sharing bits and pieces that tell the story of surnames in my family.

My Postcard Collection

For over 60 years, I saved the postcards that my family and friends sent to me and my family. I inherited my mother-in-law's collection of postcards that were sent to her and her family by her family and friends. Each postcard reveals a part of family history. Here are three of my favorite postcards in my collection.

Addressed to: Jonathan and Nira Sheintal (husband of Kim and his sister) in Washington DC from cousin Kenny who lived in DC, but was on vacation in Delaware Water Gap, PA

Date: about 1949 (postmark hard to read)

Front of Postcard: Squirrel

<u>Handwritten Message:</u> "Hi Cousins. Mama and I are having a real nice time here. There's plenty of land to run around on, but no other children to play with, I really wish you were here too. Regards to all. Love, Kenny Marx"

<u>Comments:</u> This postcard led me to the discovery that the DC address on the front of the postcard was for Jon's maternal grandfather's butcher shop around 1949.

Addressed to: Kim Klapman in Skokie, Illinois from her maternal grandparents who were on vacation in Florida

Date: March 11, 1963 (three months before my Bat Mitzyah)

Front of Postcard: Florida Seminole Family

Handwritten Message: "Dear Kim, Thank you for the delightful and interesting letters, and beautiful drawings. What color material did you get for your dress? I bet blue! The weather is still beautiful here. But I'm really a little lonesome for Chicago's exciting weather. Kiss mother and dad and Liz for us. Love, Mom and Pop"

<u>Comments:</u> My maternal grandparents went to Miami Beach for a vacation from Chicago three months before my Bat Mitzvah and thought that I would pick out a blue dress for my Bat Mitzvah. As it turned out, I picked out a pink silky dress.

<u>Addressed to:</u> Kim Sheintal in Sarasota from her sister Liz who was on vacation in Miami Beach, FL

Date: June 3, 2021

<u>Front of Postcard:</u> Beau Rivage Resort and Casino in Biloxi

Handwritten Message: "Hi Kimmie, Funny - the only stamps the hotel has is Alabama and we're in Mississippi. Go figure! And the only postcard is of their golf course. When I think of Beau Rivage, I think of that big deal family vacation to Miami Beach. First time I flew, that pool! Daddy with a broken leg, getting dressed up to fly and eat dinner - I had duck. And you took swimming lessons from a dark muscular guy? We're going to explore Biloxi today. Love, Liz"

<u>Comments:</u> Liz's message brought back memories from when I was about ten and Liz was about five and we took a family vacation with our parents to Beau Rivage Hotel on Collins Avenue in Miami Beach, Florida.

The oldest postcard in my collection was mailed in July 1941 to Palestine from United States addressed to Rosi Schonthal (mother of my husband Jon before Jon was born). Rosi lived in Haderah, Palestine. This postcard was from Bertl, Rosi's sister, who was living in DC area. From this postcard, I learned Rosi's Haderah address in 1941.
